BANDSTANDS AND SHELTERS







In 1893 the Lion became a limited company and began to look at expanding its product range. The employment of the foundry's first designer, William Cassells, meant that they could consider tackling more ambitious projects. The Lion Foundry Company Limited was successful in winning orders from corporations around the country for large cast iron structures such as bandstands, bus and tram shelters, and promenade or seaside shelters. They also secured orders for a large number of theatre canopies from Frank Matcham & Co, architects, London.

During the early years bandstands were supplied to County Limerick (1895); Ashford, Kent (1901); Windsor (1901); Strood Recreation Grounds, Maidstone, Kent (1903); Govan (1903); East Ham (1903); and Lightwoods Park, Birmingham (c1903-1911).
