Achtaíodh reachtaiocht úr maidir le lóistín na n-oibrithe talamhaochta in Albain i Mi lúil 1938 mar thoradh ar an tine sa bhoth go páirteach. Bhíothas ag dréim le bardais logánta glachadh le fiodhiltíe daingne maidir le lóistín na n-oibrithe séasúrtha. Rinne Bardas Kirkintilloch an méid seo sa bhliain 1939.

Ní dhéarnadh deármad ar an tragóid seo riamh in Albain ná in Éirinn. Tarralgaíodh aird ar an scéal aris sa bhliain 1982 nuair a mhaigh seanbhean gurbh é a fear céile coimhthíthe a thosaigh an tine d'aon turas. D'oscail péas Shráth Chluaidh fiosrúchán úr ach cuireadh deireadh gasta leis nuair a tháinig sé chun solais nach raibh go leor fianaise taobh thiar de na liamhainti.

Tugadh ómós do na hÉireannaigh óga a chaill a mbeatha cúpla uair ó shin. Léadh aifreann cuimhniúcháin ar a son ar oiléan Acla sa bhliain 1987 agus lad cailtfe le leath chead bliain. Nochtadh pláic cuimhniúcháin 10 m bliana ina dhiaidh sin agus aimsiódh sráid i gKirkintilloch 'Plás Acla' ar an lá céanna. Tá cuimhniú na héachtra seo sa trádisiún logánta ar Oiléan Acla agus i gKirkintilloch mar aon agus beidh go ceann i bhfad is cosúil.

Partly as a result of the Bothy Fire, new legislation governing the accommodation of agricultural workers in Scotland was enacted in July 1938. Local authorities were expected to adopt fairly stringent bye-laws relating to the housing of seasonal workers. Kirkintilloch Burgh did so in 1939.

The disaster has never been forgotten, either in Ireland or in Scotland. Public attention was drawn to the circumstances of the event in 1982, when an old woman claimed that her estranged husband had started the fire deliberately. Strathclyde Police opened an investigation, but quickly dropped the case when they found that there was little evidence to support the allegation.

In quieter vein, tribute has been paid to the victims on more than one occasion. A memorial mass was said in Achill in 1987, the 50th anniversary year. Ten years later, a memorial plaque was unveiled in Kirkintilloch and a street named 'Achill Place' on the same day. Remembering the event is something that is now part of local culture, both in Achill and in Kirkintilloch, and is likely to continue as such for some time to come.

Mar thoradh gu ire air Teine na Bothaig, chaidh reachdas a' riaghlaigh àite-fuirich luchd-obrach aiteachais ann an Alba a chur an gniomh anns an luchar 1938. Bhathar a' duileachadh dha uighdarrasan ionadail gabhail ri fo-lagan gu math teamann a thaobh taighdeais dha luchd-obrach seusanail. Rinn Borgh Kirkintilloch sin ann an 1939.

Cha deach a' mhòr-thubaist a dhiochuimheachadh a-riamh, ann an Éirinn no ann an Alba. Chaidh aire an t-sluagh a tharraing a-rithist gu suidheachadh an tachartais ann an 1982, nuair a chum seann bhoireannach a-mach gun do thóisich an duine aice, bhon robh i sgarte, an teine a dh'aon ghnóthach. Rinn Poilis Shráth Chluaidh rannsachadh, ach leig iad as a' chùis glè luath nuair a lorg iad nach robb fianais sam bith ann gus taic a chur ris a' chasad.

Ann am modh eile, thathar air úmhlaichd a dhéanamh dha na mairbh barrachd na aon uair. Chaidh aifreann cuimhneachaidh a ràdh ann an Acaill ann an 1987, an leth-cheudamh ceann-bliadhna. Deich bliadhna as déidh sin chaidh truinnsear cuimhneachaidh a thaisbeandadh ann an Kirkintilloch agus chaidh sráid ainmeachadh 'Ionad Acaill' air an aon latha. Tha a bhith a' cuimhneachadh an tachartais a-nis mar pháirt den chultar ionadail, an dà chuid ann an Acaill agus ann an Kirkintilloch, agus a réir coltais sin mar a tha e gu bhith san am ri teachd.


